



Three mindsets that block change on your issues



Current Narratives

#1: The Moral Narrative

Supporting the wellbeing of children is right thing to do

#2: The Future-Focused Narrative

Supporting the wellbeing of children is important for the future of our country

#3: The Instrumental Narrative

Supporting the wellbeing of children pays off in the future in terms of cost savings

#4: The Vulnerability Narrative

Supporting the wellbeing of children is important because they are the most vulnerable members of society

Counter Racist Mindsets Move Beyond the Government as Opposition

The Details: How to do Care s Collective

- 1. Move care from relational to societal by including examples of how we care for kids in our role as members of society.
- 2. Normalize sense of collective responsibility.
- 3. Name public policies/collective action/community participation as the *what* of collective caregiving. *Include but always go beyond direct caregiving.
- 4. Move attribution of responsibility for care from "them" to "us" ("those parents..." to "we all...")



3 Framing Recommendations

#1 **Stretch "care"** Describe policies and other forms of collective action as caregiving.

Expand circle of concern Emphasize that we owe care to each child in every community.

Move Beyond the Government as Opposition



The Details: How to do Care Must be Inclusive

- Emphasize all kids no matter race, place, or identity (careful with attempts to identityconnect—"lots of kids like yours...").
- 2. Use concrete examples to explain how we currently provide collective care unevenly.
- 3. Offer concrete things we can do to extend collective care to children/families of color.
- 4. Advance and normalize idea of "parents working across difference".


#1 **Stretch "care"** Describe policies and other forms of collective action as caregiving.

#3 Widen the lens Illustrate that collective caregiving happens everywhere, through every issue.






The Details: How to do Care Is Expansive


- 1. Show (stories, examples) how wide ranging policies shape children's experiences and wellbeing.
- 2. Use environment (water and air in particular) as an example of where collective action is needed to care for children.
- 3. Provide a vision of a future where we prioritize children in decision making around all issues *and* explain how we're currently falling short.




